PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO SOCIETY RULES

CHANGE OF BALANCE DATE

The WSNZ relies heavily on a number of individuals who freely give their time to help run the Society. One such member is John Hambling who over the years has accepted the task of auditing the Society's financial accounts. In order to make his job a little bit easier by removing our end of financial year away from the 'popular' 31 March, the committee has opted to run the accounts on a 1 Jan to 31 Dec year. Membership will still come up for renewal on 1 April and be accrued accordingly. As we head into winter the number of WSNZ meetings ramp up. In May the membership from each centre will meet to hear a wide range of topics. It all starts in Dunedin on Sunday 11 May when Professor John Drummond will present his second talk to the society: *Wagner and Hotels*, the sequel to *Wagner and Trains. Wagner and Hotels* looks at two life-changing moments for Wagner which took place in hotels, one in Chemnitz in 1849 and one in Stuttgart in 1864. John will repeat his talk the following Friday (16 May) in Christchurch.

A couple of weeks later, on Sunday 25 May, Wellington members will be able to hear Margaret Medlyn present an illustrated talk: *Embodying Kundry: From Metempsychosis to Metamorphosis*.

Please note that there has been a change of date for this meeting from that previously published.

On the same evening in Auckland the WSNZ AGM will take place and be followed by the third in Chris Brodrick's series of *The View from the Stage:* a look at the famous and not so famous who attended the Bayreuth festivals. The period covering the third talk is perhaps the darkest in the history of the Festival,



The first Tristan & Isolde: Ludwig and Malvina Schnorr von Carolsfeld. Is it possible they warmed up to 19th century punk or techno?

If those attending the concert performance of *Tristan & Isolde* in Auckland on 19 July encounter some strange, non-operatic sounds emanating from backstage prior to the performance, fear not. You will be in the right place. The sounds will be no more than our Tristan and Isolde getting 'in the mood'! Maybe 'warming up' would be a more accurate description!

Our lovers, who both hail from Sweden, are not only world-class opera singers but are also involved in rock music and use the genre to prepare themselves for their singing roles.

Lars Cleveman (top right)who will sing Tristan lives a musical doublelife as opera singer and performer in Sweden's first electronic underground group, Dom Dummaste which he founded in 1980 with fellow musician Martin Rössel. As an opera singer Lars has performed at Royal Swedish Opera in Stockholm, made his début at Covent Garden in 2009 as Tristan, replacing an indisposed Ben Heppner, and subsequently sang at Bayreuther Festspiele in 2011. In May 2013, Cleveman made his début at the Metropolitan Opera singing the role of Siegfried in the third of three performances of Wagner's Ring Cvcle.

His Isolde, Annalena Persson (bottom right), according to Ed Vulliamy in the Observer "will probably pump herself up with either the Rolling Stones, Bruce Springsteen or a favourite band from her native Sweden, Ebba Grön. 'It's how I get myself ready,' she explains. 'Some people at the Royal Opera in Stockholm used to ask me to turn the music down, but we're not all like that. There are people in opera who know exactly what Britney Spears is doing.' Persson is as relaxed and casual as her Isolde is intense and overpowering. She likes to talk about the 'muscularity' of the tenors singing opposite her." This opinion is backed up by Rian Evans in the Guardian "As for Persson, everything about her suggests a Wagner singer to be reckoned with. She has an almost animal presence, vital and impetuous, and her voice has a luxurious velvet tone. In Persson, Isolde's awareness of her power of sexual healing was implicit, reflected in a glowing intensity of sound and sustained right through to her ultimate transfiguration."

Phew! Could be a warm winter's night in Auckland.

For the record Persson won the 2003 International Vocal Competition for young Wagner voices in Bayreuth and has gone on to sing Senta, Isolde, Eva, Sieglinde, Brünnhilde and Kundry as well as Butterfly, Tatiana, Salome and Elizabeth in Verdi's Don Carlos.

Richard Wagner Verband International

The Wagner Society of New Zealand has resigned from the Richard Wagner Verband International (the international association of Wagner societies) as the committee cannot justify the cost of membership. A couple of years ago the cost of the Verband membership was increased to 2 Euros per WSNZ member which immediately doubled our annual subscription. For the past couple of years we managed to renegotiate a smaller levy and at the same time we looked into the benefits the WSNZ actually received for its membership. The answer was quite simple: Nothing!

We had no representation, received no financial information and had virtually no opportunity to participate in the Verband's activities as they were all Eurocentric.

Interestingly we are not alone in our decision as the famous Associació Wagneriana de Barcelona has also thrown in the towel over its dissatisfaction at the types of projects the Verband supports.

It once again gives me great pleasure to present the President's Report to the membership of the Wagner Society of New Zealand. The 2013/14 year was another special year for us, in particular the marking of the 200th anniversary of the birth of Wilhelm Richard Wagner and the culmination of those celebrations in the production of the *Ring* in Melbourne at the end of the year. In addition let's not forget New Zealand Opera's production of Der Fliegende Holländer in the middle of the year. Before we get too far ahead let's in the words of Dylan Thomas, "...begin at the beginning ... "

Overall 2013 was dominated by the Melbourne *Ring* and it is Michael Sinclair that we should thank for co-ordinating members, tickets, accommodation and travel. Despite being domiciled outside of New Zealand for much of the year he ensured that he saw the project through and, judging from reports, everyone had a great time.

The other major Wagner production of the bicentenary year was Der Fliegende Holländer which was performed in both Wellington and Auckland. The Society through its Charitable Trust, the Wagner New Zealand Foundation, was delighted to financially support the production and in particular to have the season dedicated to the memory of the late Roa Morrissey whose generous bequest has made it possible for the Society to provide support for Wagner events and activities. The forthcoming concert performance of Tristan & Isolde is another Wagner project to be granted support.

To coincide with the Melbourne *Ring* our President Emeritus Heath Lees produced, with an Australian production company, 4 DVDs on the tetralogy, A Tale Told in Music. Those of us who know Heath and have listened to his talks know what a wonderful communicator he is and if anyone can sell the Ring to 'non believers' it is Heath. After sending the DVDs to my brother-in-law, who was putting his toe in the water so to speak, I received a most enthusiastic email back wanting recommendations about which recording to buy! We all know the power of Heath's presentation skills so it was particularly nice that the WSNZ was able to support the venture and allow those outside the WSNZ to experience his passion for Wagner.

The WSNZ is extraordinarily fortunate to have such a large number of presenters who are able to cover such wide ranging topics. In 2013/4 we thank Michael Sinclair, Aidan Lang, Heath Lees, John Pattinson, Sid Kennedy, Terence Dennis and Ken Tomkins for their contributions.

We also thank those members in each centre who organised these meetings including a number of social events. In Auckland Ken Tomkins was ably supported by Helen Kirkman, Juliet Rowe, Bob O'Hara and David Colemore-Williams.

In Wellington Les Holborow handed over the reins to John Davidson who, with Tibby Warmington, Ann Mallinson and Michael Ashdown, arranged the meetings, and coordinated with the New Zealand Opera Society for a screening of *Die Meistersinger*. Thanks also to Tibby Warmington and Adrian Simcock for once again opening up their home for Wagner's birthday celebration.

In the South Island Christchurch continued to be led by Gloria Streat who, along with Elizabeth Cooch, Jenny Lee and John Pattinson, ensured that everything ran smoothly. Lesley Kendall and Terence Dennis continued their wonderful work in Dunedin. Take a quick glance at the topics on the Dunedin programme and you will see the diverse and interesting subjects they have assembled.

In last year's President's report we noted that Barry Littlewood had taken on the role of WSNZ Secretary after Michael Sinclair stepped down. Barry agreed to undertake the role until a more permanent appointment could be made. As you will be aware Peter Rowe agreed to take over the position of Secretary on a permanent basis at the end of 2013. We are all grateful to Barry for the 10 months work he did on behalf of the Society.

We also need to thank Peter for his other roles, namely our honorary solicitor and Chairman of the Wagner New Zealand Foundation in which he works with Heather Simpson, Sir Michael Hardie Boys and Terence Dennis. To those Foundation members we give our thanks.

John Hambling continues as our honorary auditor and, once again, our grateful thanks for keeping an eye on the books. We hope that the change in balance date to 31 December will ease some of the pressure and make the audit a less onerous task. The 'National' committee convenes at least four times a year thanks to the conference call facilities provided by Minter Ellison. There was another change in committee membership during the year when Les Holborow stood down and was replaced by John Davidson. Wellington members and those of us on the committee would like to thank Les for his valuable input over the last few years and to also extend a warm welcome to John.

Committee members during 2013/14 were Christopher Brodrick (President), Ken Tomkins (Vice President), Barry Littlewood/ Peter Rowe (Secretary), Jeanette Miller (Treasurer), Juliet Rowe (Minute Secretary), Bob O'Hara (Auckland), Les Holborow/John Davidson (Wellington), Gloria Streat (Christchurch), Lesley Kendall (Dunedin). My thanks to the committee for all the time you spend on ensuring that we have a smoothly run society. Without people being prepared to help out we would not have a society!

The task of writing a newsletter on average once every eight weeks is somewhat daunting and can take a considerable amount of time and effort. There is nothing wrong with what we offer. We just have to make sure that we continue to attract new and younger members!
